"I saw Jack McIvor a few days ago and he looks well. Walter Church is also here in Training Wing and a few fellows from the Engineering Building."

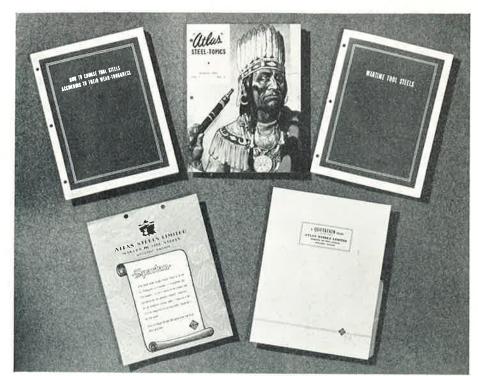
